FROM THE VILLAGE PRESIDENT'S DESK

Welcome to the Inaugural Edition of Berkeley Connects

Welcome Berkeley residents and businesses to the inaugural edition of "Berkeley Connects." The new moniker and renamed quarterly newsletter reinforces the goals and objectives of the Board of Trustees and Berkeley employees to better *connect* our residents to services and opportunities available.

"Berkeley Connects" will also bring focus to our partners outside of our borders who *connect* with our 5,000 plus residents to enhance the quality of life by improving our schools, parks, roads, bridges, infrastructure and civic needs. The project planning and revenue stream required to achieve our collective goals are the main objective of our partners.

The continued efforts to improve our community began with the updated Strategic Plan for the Village of Berkeley, adopted for action in 2017. This plan was developed by the Board of Trustees, department leadership and staff to focus on collective efforts of all working toward the common goal to best serve the community through long-term planning.

The first priority and most effective way to serve is fiscal responsibility in Village finances. Village staff presented a balanced budget for fiscal year 2019-2020 at the February Budget Workshop to the Board of Trustees. Offering the same or improved services can be a difficult task to achieve when equating declining or flat revenues against the ever increasing costs of operations. Congratulations and thank you to Village Administrator Rudy Espiritu, Fire Chief Mike Kuryla, Police Chief Tim Larem, Public Works Superintendent Joe Wagner, Assistant Village Administrator Brandiss Martin and all who worked towards a balanced budget with the direction of the Board of Trustees. A total team effort year in and year out for the community.

While a working budget for fiscal year operations is a top priority, long-term planning requires Board and staff to better *connect* with our Berkeley partners locally, regionally as well as the state and federal levels. The Village has the

responsibility of coordinating efforts with our local Park Districts (Berkeley, Memorial and Elmhurst), the Berkeley Public Library, School Districts #87 and #209, in order to achieve our goals collectively. Grant and project funding is generally received more favorably at the State and Federal levels with local entities applying jointly.

A good example of a current collaborative effort is the Village of Berkeley, the Berkeley Park District and the Village of Hillside *connecting* to apply for a regional planning grant to improve the business district at Taft and Electric Avenues as well as the Illinois Prairie Path through Berkeley and Hillside. We wait anxiously for grant funding approval so that this critical section of our region can be potentially upgraded to better serve the area for the next 50 years.

The Village and the Illinois Tollway Authority co-hosted an open house on January 23rd to a full house of Berkeley residents regarding the 294 Tollway Expansion Project that is happening over the next six years. This project will have a big impact on Berkeley in a positive manner over the long term. Berkeley is losing six (6) single family homes and valuable park land (owned by the Toll Authority) to the expansion of 294 at our western border. These losses will affect the entire community. However, your Village Board and staff are working with the Toll Authority to compensate in other areas of town as well as our Police, Fire and Public Works Departments in order to better serve the community. This is a generational change to the Tollway which has not seen this type of upgrade since the original construction over 50 years ago. Change is inevitable, but change is also opportunity. The Village Board is fully committed to *connecting* with the Illinois Toll Authority to improve the regional transportation system while also improving the Berkeley community.

The spring of 2019 will provide the opportunity to complete the flood mitigation project at the northeast section of town. Once complete, the retention pond and pumping station will regulate rain water in our storm sewer system. Over 800 homes and businesses will benefit from the 53 acre feet of storm water storage capacity that the new pond will provide. Berkeley *connected* funding from the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District, Illinois Department of Transportation, Cook County Community Disaster Recovery Funds, as well as matching funds from the Village, to complete this vital project.

2019 will also bring an increased focus to much needed economic development planning throughout the community. The Village Board will consider recommendations of BDI, a firm hired to assess the needs of our community in order to develop a long term development plan. These needs were determined through interviews of business and community leaders, current demographics, physical assets in and around Berkeley, as well as other key elements to proper economic development planning. We look forward to sharing this plan with you in the coming months.

While good things are happening in and around Berkeley, our continued goal is to stay *connected* with you, the resident, in order to keep you better informed with all that is Berkeley.

Backyard Fun and Caution

As the days get longer and the snow starts to melt thoughts of being in our yards enjoying warmer evenings with family and friends are on our minds. Sounds fantastic! Now let us do it in a safe manner.

Grills:

The use of fire is unavoidable when preparing the perfect meal on the grill; therefore, there is inherent risk present whenever we have our grills lit and ready for action. Just under 9,000 home fires occur due to grilling each year. Below are tips to help avoid a fire from occurring at your home.

- Be sure to inspect all fittings on your propane grill. This should include the tank that may be from last grilling season to all connections back to the grill itself. Be sure to remove all debris to avoid flare-ups and fires that may take place while you are not nearby.
- Light charcoal grill by using approved methods and starter fluids only. The use of fossil fuels such as gasoline are not approved accelerants.
- Use the grill in an open, outdoor area only; do not relocate the grill to the garage because of inclement weather. It is not worth the risk of a potential garage fire which may spread to your home.

Outdoor Fire Pits:

The use of fire pits bring their own concerns when not handled properly. Never have a fire pit close to the house or garage. Never sit so close to the fire pit that if one slips forward they may fall into fire.

- Never allow children to be around a fire pit without responsible supervision.
- Do not throw lawn waste or paper into the fire pit, embers may float away and ignite fires elsewhere.
- Never throw buckets of waters on fires unless there is an emergency. Instead, spread out glowing
 embers and allow to cool. This will prevent thick clouds of smoke that may cause repository issues
 for you and others that are nearby.

Smoke Detectors:

As we change our clocks to day light savings, remember to change batteries in Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Detectors.

Stormwater Education

How you can help with Lawn & Garden

Lawn and garden activities can produce a number of instances where the runoff of fertilizers, pesticides and yard waste can enter into the storm water system. While maintaining a beautiful property do not damage to the environment. Adjusting some of your practices for better results without the curbside impact:

Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly only in recommended amounts. Use less toxic and environmentally friendly options. Mulches are usually wood bark chips, Wood grindings, pine straws, nut shells, small gravel, or shredded landscape clippings. Currently, wood chips are available for FREE at our community garden club.

Sweep up after cutting your lawn or blown grass clippings back into the yard otherwise these clippings will eventually enter a storm drain and either clog the drain or degrade over time within the system. It also a violation of village ordinance to blow debris into the street. Do not water your lawn on a fixed schedule. Water your lawn when it needs it, but even then don't overwater it as such a practice can easily carry pollution to the storm system. For more ways that you can help, visit: www.berkeley.il.us.
